Round up by the Chaplains, Sister Maggie and Reverend Mary

As I write so many of our students are busy preparing our Christmas liturgy in the social court, which promises to be a very moving act of worship. This year even more movement and symbolic action is involved with the choir, the orchestra and those involved in the drama all working together. Many staff have commented in previous years that they feel the movement from Advent to Christmas begins with the school Christmas liturgy, saying, "Now I feel Christmas has really started". Our hope is; that for the young people taking part, and for the parents, carers and



friends who come and watch, that we can communicate something of the heart of the Christmas message of God's gift to the world in Christ, and of our calling to play a part in being bearers of God's good news.

So much of this calling has been apparent throughout this busy term. A few highlights from the perspective of the chaplains have included: A moving act of solidarity with those who are persecuted for their faith, in which year 8 pupils released



balloons with prayers for those who are suffering attached to them. Our school has featured in a publication of work from "Ten Leading Schools" in which we were singled out from educational establishments from across the UK for our commitment to nurturing an active life of prayer in our community. Staff and pupils collaborated to provide a very successful hunger lunch raising money for CAFOD earlier this term which was great



fun as well as really successful. Staff prayer has been very well attended and beautifully led by several staff members. On one of the recent "snow days" it was lovely to see staff still stopping to

pray before they headed home, and the mutual support of this prayer is something lots of us treasure. We have just completed an amazing week of Reconciliation for Advent with wonderful worship led by the R.E. staff and lovely resources prepared by Sr. Maggie. We are so very grateful to the Catholic clergy who were able to come and support this important work, whilst we are without an ordained Catholic chaplain. Feedback from the pupils about their experience of Reconciliation affirms how much they value this opportunity to be listened to by their priests and how they feel helped when they are able to talk and pray about whatever is broken or hurting in their lives and to ask for God's forgiveness. One of the Catholic priests reflected that he felt it is an honour to come and engage with the pupils in this way, and that every time a child feels helped by this, it is a precious moment. We are hugely grateful for every support the school receives from the parishes and our dioceses, both Anglican and Catholic.



Pupils from school have been taking their Christian service out into a number of the parishes by, for example, organising cake

sales for their chosen charities. We were really glad to welcome one of the Welsh BaccaLaureate groups to St Giles' when they were raising money for Hope House. The congregation were delighted to meet the young people who took part in the service as well as selling delicious cakes and chatting about their charity with knowledge and enthusiasm.

It has been such a busy term and we are now looking forward to the Christmas celebrations. We wish you a peaceful and joyful Christmas!

The ICT department at St Joseph's has two brilliant ICT suites with desktop computers, laptops and iPads.

We teach a variety of topics to pupils, ranging from Web design to Word Processing. We make use of the **St Joseph's E-Learning centre** in every lesson at Key Stage 3. Please ask your child to show you this website if you are not already familiar with it.

Within the department we run:

- Weekly GCSE revision sessions
- Coding Club
- Digital Leaders (year 8 and 9)
- Digital Champions (year 10)
- And in the new year we hope to launch our year 7 e-safety advocates

Hwb & Office365

Hwb is the all Wales digital platform which allows pupils access to a wide range of resources, tools and activities. All pupils have an account, and we encourage them to use their account in school and at home. It should work on any device with a browser and internet connection.

Office 365 accounts can be accessed through Hwb and this is where all the Microsoft Office tools can be found, as well as pupil e-mail. This is a great resource, enabling pupils to use the type of software used in school, at home – all for free.

Part of the Office 365 suite is OneDrive, which provides 1 Terabyte of cloud storage for each pupil. This is a great place to store files for use at home and in school, such as homework.

Coding Club

This is an opportunity for pupils to come and have a go at coding and computer programming.

Any pupil from Years 7, 8 or 9 are welcome. It doesn't matter if you are a complete beginner, or an expert, all are welcome.

Pupils can try out software such as Scratch, Python, or Hour of Code. We have Raspberry Pi's and

BBC Microbits to connect and program.

Some pupils even dismantled and re-assembled an old computer to see how they are built.

Safer Internet Day

Safer Internet Day 2018 will be celebrated globally on Tuesday 6th February 2018 with the slogan "Create, Connect and Share Respect: A better internet starts with you".

Here at St Joseph's, we support this event and Year 7 pupils will be starting a project in January about using the internet safely and responsibly. It involves a variety of activities to raise awareness, and access online resources and advice from organizations for pupils and parents/carers.

In our school the digital leaders started 2 years ago. However, this year it has changed slightly. All of the digital leaders from year 8 and year 9 have a specific department/teacher to help. Each meeting we learn a new skill to show our department so they are able to use ICT in their lessons. The skills which we have covered so far are: comic life, poster my wall, HWB dashboard.

School Getaways...

Poland

The trip to Krakow was a first for the St Joseph's History Department and it definitely won't be the last. I'm never short of words, but this experience certainly left me speechless.

Witnessing the true horror the Nazis inflicted on the German

Jewish population during WWII will never leave me. We saw and heard the most heart wrenching and spine chilling stories of men, women and children whose only crime was to not fit in with the twisted Nazi ideology. As a mother and a teacher I couldn't bring myself to look at some of the artifacts in Auschwitz concentration camp, but the fact that they have been preserved ensures that generations to come will never forget the Holocaust. We visited the memorial of Maximilian Kolbe (toward the end of his second month in Auschwitz, men were chosen to face death by starvation to warn against escapes. Kolbe was not chosen but volunteered to take the place of a man with a family). The eeriness of Birkenhau Death Camp was truly horrifying, the pain and suffering they must have felt was unimaginable. One of the guides said something which struck me about the prisoners of this ghastly place....." hope was the last thing to go".

A trip to Schindler's Factory was very informative and humbling, an example of true humanity.

Krakow itself was a magical town, full of enchanting streets and a beautiful main square....always time for a little retail therapy!

I have said it before and I'll say it again, our pupils, your children are one of a kind. They were respectful, inquisitive and mature



throughout the 3 day trip. I hope that they made memories that will never leave them. It wasn't all about having fun, although we did have fun too, it was about experiencing something you can't get from a history text book.

I would like to sincerely thank Mr Wilkinson, Mrs Arnull, Mr Woodward and Mrs E Hughes for their support, help and company.
