### Lent at St Joseph's

In Lent many Christians try particularly hard to connect faith and life and to be generous in giving to the poor. Our prayer in school has been a great reminder of these things and a huge amount of effort has been given to raising funds for charities and thinking about how each of us can serve others and our community. St David's Day celebrations and the annual school Eisteddfod gave us a focus for reflection upon themes of loving service and giving of our best.



### Reconciliation

communities. The generous way in which the young people here want to pray for others is always an inspiration.


### Whole School Eucharist

Bishop Gregory has kindly given us permission to involve the pupils even more fully than they do at church, and through their voices we will be reminded of how God blesses us so richly and calls us to show others Christ's costly love.

# Golden Goodbye to Reverend Mary Stallard

After seven wonderful years, we sadly say goodbye to our friend and colleague, Reverend Mary Stallard, Anglican Chaplain to St. Joseph's. Mary has touched the lives of everyone in our community in such a profound and beautiful way. She will be greatly missed by us all.

On Monday evening, the staff celebrated Mary's friendship and ministry in a beautiful prayer service. Each member of staff was invited to share a memory, thought or feeling about Mary and these were collected and presented to Mary, during the service, as a 'shared homily'. The contributions paid tribute to Mary's many gifts, talents and qualities and were a testament to how highly regarded and loved she is by us all. Colleagues identified her 'wicked sense of humour', her incredible determination in training for the half marathon in aid of Clatterbridge Cancer Centre and Macmillan, the love and support she has shown to staff and pupils as well as ministering to us in prayer and how we have all benefitted from her prayer ministry. There were so many amazing comments but I think Sr. Maggie's reflection of Mary captures how we all feel about her and it is this I would like to share with you all:

Mary, your wonderful qualities are so manifold; trying to tabulate your goodness and giftedness is very difficult! You are an absolute treasure and will be greatly missed. Nothing is too much trouble for you – always available, always eager to serve. No matter how busy you are, you always find time for people, especially those in distress of all kinds. You have been there for all of us in our school community: Governors, staff, pupils, parents and all who are linked with St. Joseph's in any way.



In your role as Anglican Chaplain you have been a painstaking communicator between the RE Centre, the Anglican community and school, making wise judgements and working towards clarity and cohesion. In all your relationships you have worked with integrity, sensitivity and absolute commitment. In making judgements, you are focussed, measured and thoughtful, genuinely trying to bring about clarity and cohesion with compassion and care.

You have many practical gifts which contribute towards your

ministry in all its aspects; not only in school but also way beyond school, for example, the inspiration and organisation of providing an opportunity for our young people to experience the wonder of Taize. Despite all this courage and commitment in the midst of pressures of all kinds, you remain adamantly self-effacing.

Your knowledge, of Theology and Scripture provides the bedrock of your thinking, speaking and doing. Your sense of prayer is profound providing the centre from which all your giftedness is derived. At the very core of your being is your commitment to Christ: "Nothing can separate us from the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus".

Thank you Mary from the bottom of our hearts from all of us here at St. Joseph's. We wish you well in your new role as Archdeacon in the Diocese of Bangor. Our loss is their gain. Blessings on your journey.


### Here's what the pupils had to say...

## Lights, Camera, Action!

The Drama department consists of Mrs Melanie Clark and Mrs Ffion Canning-Russell. There are excellent facilities including a purpose-built drama studio housing a number of theatre lights, a floor-to-ceiling screen and a range of audio equipment. It has a lighting control room and well-stocked costume room. Such facilities allow pupils to enhance the pupils' practical and creative performances and gain new technical skills.

Drama is taught from Year 8 to Year 11 with the subject being a popular option choice. The key stage 3 course is based on practical work which focuses on developing social skills such as self-control, co-operation and collaboration. Lessons are structured to follow the pattern of preparation, performance and evaluation where pupils are encouraged to be respond maturely and provide constructive feedback.

GCSE pupils are encouraged to become more independent, organising their own rehearsal schedules, providing technician support for other groups and performing for a range of audiences.



The drama department plays an active role in supporting the ethos of the school. Drama pupils regularly perform in the opening of the school mass or Eucharist as well as the annual Christmas liturgy for the school and the wider community. Pupils are involved in a number of extra-curricular activities. Every Christmas music and drama pupils go to see the Rock 'n' Roll pantomime at Theatr Clywd, drama GCSE pupils were invited to Glyndwr to watch a degree student presentation of 'Romeo and Juliet' and most recently drama pupils joined history pupils at Sale Arts Theatre to see a performance of 'Hitler on Trial'.

Every Thursday evening there is an Expressive Arts club for all years offering Singing, Dance and Drama and this is run by Miss Kiera Pugh and Miss Georgina Dixon. GCSE pupils regularly perform their practical work for family, friends and other drama pupils and all pupils are encouraged to use the drama studio every day to rehearse their practical work and offer each other support and advice.

Please remember the importance of preparing well for your exams and make sure you have all the correct equipment before your examinations start.

- A clear pencil case or plastic bag containing writing materials needed to complete the paper (please

do not bring a coloured pencil case).

- Black ink or ballpoint pens. No eraser pens or correction pens are allowed.
- Pencils, erasers and highlighter pens.
- A small bottle of water (labels must be removed from bottles).
- Mathematical equipment, including a calculator (with no back).

## Mobile 'Phones

Mobile phones and other electronic devices such as iPods, iPads and cameras are not allowed in school.

In exceptional circumstances, if pupils need to bring a mobile phone into school then parents / carers must write to me asking permission beforehand and stating the reason for the request. If the request is granted, a contract will be signed to ensure that strict guidelines are adhered to e.g. the mobile phone must be kept in a case with the pupil's name clearly marked on it and the phone must be handed to reception immediately upon arrival and collected at the end of the day.

For those pupils with agreements in place, there are an increasing number of phones that are brought for safe-keeping in unsuitable cases and inadequately labeled. Therefore if phones are not presented in a suitable case the agreement will be withdrawn.
