Reflection by Sister Maggie

On the 7th of January, we had a Staff Development Day prior to the children returning to school the following day. This enabled us to focus on a timetable of academic initiatives and Pastoral Care in school. From this, a range of attendant issues, such as those related to relationships with external authorities, were also discussed. These external relationships are important because, as a school working closely with local authorities, we are able to provide a cohesive structure which supports all our children and their families.

We began this day in Prayer as we always do. We chose to focus on the Christmas Liturgy Reflection: "Follow the light of Christ". The Liturgy itself was a powerful and truly beautiful presentation of the Christmas story. The reverence

and respect of the children as they worked with staff, through music and dramatic story-telling, was a profound experience. It culminated in each child lighting a candle and holding it as they were seated looking at the crib with Mary and Joseph also holding a large candle, representing Christ the Light of the world.

The children were absolutely still.



The light of the candles lit up their faces. It was a beautiful moment which they held without moving for a period of time. Our care for the children is at every level: body, mind and spirit. In this first week back in school some Year 10 and 11 pupils had examinations or preparation for This required exams. detailed organisation related to staff and pupils involved. In practical terms, rooms were designated and posters were displayed outside requesting silence. It also ensured that the external environment conducive to optimum potential for children to concentrate, and so be able to do the best they could in the examination itself.

The theme for the first week back in school after Christmas was the Celebration of the Feast of the Epiphany: We remembered how the three wise men, guided by the light of the star came from the East, to pay homage to the Christ child. Their journey was far from being straightforward. They needed courage and persistence

in their endeavour to find the Christ child. We would all do well to reflect on what guides us throughout our lives. How do we approach each day and face the challenges. Let us be focussed, as were our children in the Christmas Liturgy, as they all turned towards the Light of Christ.

On January 15^{th,} Year 10 had a Wellbeing Day. This was a wonderful opportunity for them to reflect on who they are at different levels of BE-ING not just things they do. They have time away from a normal school day to slow down, be still, and become aware 'of themselves' what they feel, experience, and where their strengths and weaknesses are.

On the 18th of January we celebrated the Octave of Prayers for Christian Unity, which, in a way is interesting regarding timing, because it draws together personal experience the children reflecting on their own depth and values as individuals; and then bringing those values together in Christian Unity.

On the 28^{th} of January Year 10 pupils went with members of the History and Drama Department to a day out of school reflecting on the topic: 'Hitler on Trial'. They considered the life of Hitler, whose behaviour had such devastating effects on others: destroying the lives of millions of people. In the context of this, children were given time to reflect on what Hitler did and what was so patently wrong in what he did. They also reflected

on the soldiers and others who carried out Hilter's orders and went along with this, rather than having the courage to stand up for truth and justice – the silent majority who could have, and should have been brave enough to stand together and do what was right and just.

Smart Watches and FitBits

Smart watches should not be brought into school. Examination regulations ban the wearing of smart watches on the grounds of malpractice potential and cheating. However, there are other implications of smart devices which are of concern: distraction, loss/theft, and safequarding issues. These devices fall outside our insurance policy. Fitbits are allowed in school as long as they only display the time and count steps. Thank you. Mr Wilkinson

Mobile Phones

Mobile phones and electronic devices such as iPods, iPads and cameras are not allowed in school.

In exceptional circumstances, if pupils need to bring a mobile phone into school then parents/carers must write to me asking permission beforehand and stating the reason for the request. If the request is granted, a contract will be signed to ensure that strict guidelines are adhered to e.g. the mobile phone must be kept in a case with the pupil's name clearly marked on it and the

phone must be handed reception immediately nogu arrival and collected at the end of the day.

For those pupils with agreements in place, there are an increasing number of phones that are brought for safe-keeping unsuitable cases and inadequately labelled. Therefore if phones are not presented in a case/envelope suitable agreement will be withdrawn. Alternatively, clear plastic pencil cases are available to purchase from Reception. Mr Wilkinson
