## Reflection by Sister Maggie

### Ash Wednesday

On 6<sup>th</sup> March we celebrated Ash Wednesday which marks the beginning of the Church's calendar which we call Lent. This is predominantly a time of repentance when we acknowledge our failures and promise to make a greater effort to act in accordance with the values that Christ taught us.

The service for Ash Wednesday was very simple in content. We acknowledged our own failures and took time to reflect on these. Each person received ashes on their foreheads marked in the sign of the cross. The ashes on our foreheads mark us as people who recognise our weaknesses and our sinfulness who are trying to be more committed to Christ.

In Lent itself there are three main elements which mark it as a time

of preparation for the Feast of Easter.

The first is **prayer** which is not merely words, it is the raising up of the mind and heart to God, so that we can be increasingly aware of God's spirit guiding and inspiring us to be faithful to the life giving values which Christ taught us.

The second element of Lent is **fasting** – doing without in some things we enjoy in order to control our selfish behaviour and to rely on God more and thus becoming sensitive to the needs of others, even in a small way.

This helps us take more time for prayer and reflections.



There is also the other more important element of fasting which is doing without some food so that we can help others in their need. This attitude leads us naturally into the last third element of Lent: **Almsgiving**.

An excellent example of Almsgiving is the CAFOD Lent fast day which was held on 15<sup>th</sup> March in school as well as in parishes, where children and adults try to refrain from eating some food – "give up something" as we say, so that the money saved by depriving ourselves of some food, we are able to use for others in their needs.

The organisation of CAFOD will ensure that the money saved from denying ourselves some food can be used to serve the starving people of the world.

### Catholic Eucharist

A Catholic Eucharist was celebrated on 19<sup>th</sup> March in

honour of St Joseph on his Feast Day. The theme chosen for this mass was "Whatever your work is put your heart into it" taken from St Paul's letter to the Colossians.

Our Celebrant for the Mass was Father Paul Shaw, the Chaplain of Chester Catholic High School. It was the first time he came to celebrate the Eucharist with us. He was accompanied by Father Bernard Lordan and Deacon Steve Davies.

As the opening hymn was sung Priest Deacon and alter servers led the procession in the sports hall followed by our governors and other visitors. The first hymn was "Let our praise be your welcome". Our Year 11 pupils then provided us with a very relaxing and energising welcome. Our first scripture reading was as our theme, St Paul's letter to the Colossians. The second reading was from St Mathew's Gospel which speaks of St Joseph as a man of honour called to take care of Mary and Jesus.

The homily was given by Father Shaw on our theme. As he shared his reflections it was obvious that he felt "at home" with the pupils. In fact he knew quite a number of our past pupils by name because they had been in the Catholic High Sixth Form. The pupils responded very enthusiastically - it was a joyful and encouraging.

The very centre of the Eucharist is of course when staff and pupils come forward to receive Jesus in Holy Communion. This is always done with great dignity and reflection.

The celebration culminated with our final hymn "How great is our God".

### Year Assemblies from 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> April

This year the theme chosen for our Lenten Reflection was the **Last words of Jesus on the cross.**

Staff prepared and led the Assembly by reflecting on the last words of Jesus on the cross. Three pupils helped by controlling the PowerPoint and another two using simple movements to tell the story.

To set the scene there was a display which showed a large empty cross surrounded by seven candles already lit. These represented the seven last words of Jesus, as he lay dying on the cross.

After each reflection a child held up the lit candle – paused - then blew it out reminding us that the words were of Jesus dying. When it came to the last of the seven words: **"Father into your hands I commend my spirit"** two pupils knelt in quiet reverence by the side of the cross. After a few moments they stood up, lifted the cross and placed it in a stand so that it stood tall and empty. They then gently draped a white cloth on the arms of the cross representing the Risen Christ.

The final movement was to light the large central candle to proclaim the **resurrection of**

**Christ triumphant over death.** The beautiful hymn: "Born for this" was played. Everyone gazed at the candle and listened to the words.

When the hymn was finished the two children by the cross held their position in silent contemplation with staff and other pupils involved until all those watching had left the social court in silence.



This whole experience was certainly not a mere performance, it was a gentle and moving expression of shared faith.

After one of the Assemblies a pupil came to me spontaneously to say that she felt the

Assembly gave her courage and more understanding about Jesus and his love for us.

She brought me this message which she wrote out herself.

*"Personally I thought that the Assembly was really inspiring with the lovely lighting from where I was sitting in the social court. I loved how we had a chance to reflect on the crucifixion. The whole thing was amazing and I want to thank Sister Maggie and the other staff for making us think about what Easter is really about. I hope that everyone has a happy and safe Easter".*

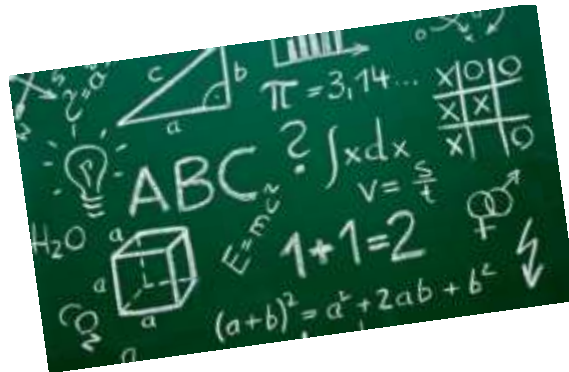

## School Meal Charges

In line with Wrexham County Borough Council policy on fees and charges, it is the intention to increase the cost of school meals. From Monday 29<sup>th</sup> April 2019, the cost of the meal of the day and the free meal allowance will be £2.45 and there will be an increase of 2% on all cash cafeteria individually priced items.

## Together Creating Communities

This year we, the TCC group in St Joseph's, have been working on the following issues;

**Single Use Plastic & the Environment** - we want to raise awareness of the environmental impact of single use plastic and reduce the amount in the environment. Firstly, we asked the canteen for single use plastic cutlery in the dining room to be removed, and straws to be available on request only, which reduced the amount of plastic that is used there. We are in the process of planning a PSE session on the subject of "Single Use Plastics and the Environment" to deliver to the Year 7s in PSE during May. We invited the Councillor Mark Jones into school to talk about what is happening in Wrexham to tackle the issue in the community. We attended a Plastic Free Wrexham Campaign meeting where we learned of the steps being taken to become a plastic free town and we have been given permission from Mr Wilkinson to begin the process of becoming a Plastic Free School.

**Bus Passes** - we are trying to get pupils who need them to be allowed to have two bus passes, so they can get on the bus to school from wherever they happen to be staying. Some pupils stay with their Mum some days and their Dad on other days and they are unable to use their passes from both places. We met

with Councillor Phil Wynn, who is the Lead Member for Education in Wrexham Council, to discuss this matter. We found out that you can apply to have two passes and decisions are made based on circumstances and officers are aware of the issue across Wrexham.

Some members of our TCC group in school are part of TCC's youth group which involves other young people from different member groups. Anyone from school is welcome to attend this group which usually meets on Wednesdays 6-8pm (please contact TCC on 01978 262588 for more information). Within this group and at school we have been working on:

**Mental Health Issues** - We want all schools to become more aware of mental health issues, to understand mental health better and to promote good mental health within schools. One of the aims of our mental health campaign is for all schools to ensure they have staff trained in Mental Health First Aid. We have had several meetings and joined



with St Christopher's School to meet with Mark Isherwood AM to discuss our campaign. The AM agreed to support our campaign, as well as sign a petition campaigning on the issue of

mental health first aiders and offered to put a question to the Education Minister Kirsty Williams. Some of the staff at St Joseph's are attending Mental Health First Aid Training next term and organisations such as Mind are invited into school to work with pupils in Year 11. We want to encourage all schools to take part in this campaign.

**Town of Sanctuary** - We want to make our town a more welcoming place for refugees and to have Wrexham officially recognised as a 'Town of Sanctuary', to do this we are asking the community to sign a pledge in support of this campaign. Pledges can be found on the TCC website or collected from the Association of Voluntary Organisations (AVOW) in Wrexham. We attended the 'Town of Sanctuary' launch event, and spoke about our work to make St Joseph's the first School of Sanctuary in North Wales, to support this campaign. We also interviewed a refugee on local radio show SIEMA Good Vibes, on Calon FM, and asked her to describe her life experiences as a refugee and find out if she is settled in Wrexham now. We are glad to say that she feels that Wrexham has welcomed her after her terrible ordeal. The radio show will be broadcast on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> April at 1300. You can also listen to the show for one week afterwards through the Calon FM website.
