## Reflection by Sister Maggie

On Thursday May 2<sup>nd</sup> our Year 11 pupils. Together with families and staff had their leaving Service of Celebration. This is always a wonderful balance of vibrant joy together with deep reflection and prayer. The celebration began with Mr Griffiths, their year head, introducing the celebration with entertaining stories about the year group and recalling the depth of life giving values which the pupils expressed. Our Year 11 Drama group then welcomed us with a joyful and amusing rendering of aspects of school life involving staff and pupils. This set the tone for working together. As well as joys in school life, there are also challenges when we admit our limitations, let ourselves down, and sometimes hurt others as well. It's at times like this that we need to remember that God is always

with us. To express this we used a beautiful poem called: *Footprints in the sand*. The picture shows two sets of footprints: the person and God but at one stage of the journey there was only one set of



prints. The person wanted to know why there was just one set of foot prints, when before there had been two sets. He thought that was because God had abandoned him... This in fact was not the case. The truth was that at those difficult times, when you see only one set of footprints,

that was when God carried you. This was expressed beautifully in song and dance. The two readings from scripture both speak of trust. From the book of proverbs the boys choir sang: "*I will trust in you alone for your endless mercy follows me your goodness will lead me home*". This song always resonates with me together with the words of Jesus to his apostles. "*Do not let your hearts be troubled trust in God still and trust in me*". There then followed an offering remembering the gifts they had received at St. Joseph's and their hopes and aspirations for the future. The culmination of the celebration, which is most poignant and powerful, is the anointing. We anointed them when they came to us in Year 7. Now in Year 11 we anoint and bless them again on their journey as they prepare to leave us. To assist them at this time of transition they are given a book

entitled- "*Trust the Road*". We ask that God will indeed bless them as they continue their journey in "*living life to the full*" as Jesus promised.

GCSE exams began on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> of May. This is always a stressful time for staff and pupils. Staff provide extra lessons in preparation for specific exams. These are often outside of normal school time including some sessions on a Saturday. This extra work and commitment comes from the fact that Christian Values are at the very heart of the school. In order to achieve sound academic accolades it is necessary to have these underpinning values which enable staff to teach with commitment and academic rigour thus engaging children to learn. It is imperative that children themselves are equally committed to work conscientiously and apply themselves to what is being taught. They need to acquire accurate information and make it their own so that they are capable of comprehending the information and developing an argument with clarity and precision. To ensure that those taking examinations have the optimum opportunity to do their best, silence around exam areas is mandatory, and there are restrictions of access to certain areas. Staff are also aware of individuals who are hyper anxious and spent time encouraging and reassuring them.

One of our staff, Mrs Lorraine McKeown has been in our minds

and hearts since the beginning of the academic year because she was taken seriously ill. It was a shock to hear at the beginning of May that she was in intensive care. Colleagues and pupils gathered together to pray for Lorraine and her family. On Thursday, 9<sup>th</sup> May we heard that she had sadly passed away peacefully, surrounded by her family. Throughout her illness, Lorraine had been courageous and positive in the midst of her struggle. On Tuesday, 21<sup>st</sup> May the funeral took place in St. Mary's Cathedral. The church was



absolutely packed with family, friends, staff and pupils both past and present. Many people could only stand at the back of the cathedral. Father Adrian Wilcock, who has known Lorraine for many years, was the celebrant, and his words were deeply moving and full of compassion. Some of our children took part in the celebration by singing in the choir which was truly powerful and radiant. The children reading the prayers of the faithful did it with dignity, poise and commitment. Many of our children were clearly very upset and tearful. Lorraine's husband gave the Eulogy. In the midst of his deep pain and loss he

brought tears of laughter and sorrow as he told stories from her life of love and compassion. It's hard to describe the atmosphere in the crowded church. It was a wonderful blend of sorrow and loss together with profound love and joy. After the mass all staff gathered together in school to celebrate her life and support each other in their loss. After the half term holiday there will be an opportunity for the school community to gather once more for prayer and reflection to celebrate and remember Lorraine. Pupils from 9 Kolbe (Mrs McKeown's form class) will be leading assemblies in remembrance of their much loved teacher.

## Techniquest bring driverless technology to Science

Some of our lucky year 7 and year 8 classes took part in a CrumbleBots Workshop hosted by Techniquest Glyndŵr. This was the first time the new CrumbleBots have made their way into schools since being obtained by Techniquest as part of their 'Engineering the Future' project. The day involved an hours workshop per group where pupils were able to discuss the importance of developing driverless technology before learning how to use computer coding to control the actions of the robots.

As part of the experience pupils managed to control the sparkles



on the robots so that each movement made a different light pattern. They also used coding to allow the cars to follow roads of their own design without telling it how! Workshops like these are hoping to tackle the engineering skills gap by attracting more school-age children – girls and boys - to study Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths subjects.

## Year 8 Girls take off to Airbus

This week a group of our Year 8 girls visited Airbus Broughton to carry out some research for their industrial projects they are working on. The girls are currently taking part in Go4SET which is an environmentally themed 10 week STEM project for 12-14 year old girls. It is a



competition run by the Engineering Development Trust (EDT) with the aim to inspire students towards STEM related careers by linking education and industry in real life situations using hands on learning and skills development. Their task is to design an Eco-Factory for which they have to create a model and complete professionally written and bound report. The girls took a tour of the A320 and A330 factories where they could see the wings for these craft through

all stages of development. They took part in team building tasks, worked on their projects with their Airbus mentors, and they even took flight in the Airbus virtual reality suite.
