Art & Design Celf a Dylunio



GCSE Art and Design is a popular option for pupils. The classes are mixed ability and average approximately 25 pupils per class.

The course consists of:
60% Portfolio (coursework)
40% Externally set assignment (exam)

You will produce a portfolio of work which will form the coursework element of the course and this makes up 60% of your final mark. The external Controlled Assessment (examination) begins in the January of Year 11 and forms 40% of your final mark. For the External Controlled Assessment students will spend a minimum of six weeks preparing and developing a body of work which culminates in a ten-hour exam to produce a final piece. All work is marked internally and then moderated externally by the examination board (WJEC).

There are four assessment objectives that form the marking framework. Over the course of the projects, you will cover all these assessment objectives. As a part of this, you will critique art and work in the style of artists using their techniques. You will develop your work and experiment with many techniques. You will play and get messy whilst honing your artistic skills and finding your niche. Techniques, which can be covered, will consist of drawing, painting, 3D sculptures, printmaking, stitch, photography and mixed media.

Art and Design qualification have a large workload. While the heavy workload can be an initial shock those who survive emerge with focus, organisational and time management skills that many other students dream of. Homework is set fortnightly and coursework is expected to be continuously developed outside the timetabled allocation. Extra-curricular lessons are offered to GCSE pupils each week to accommodate catching up or further progression within their work.

Every year there will be an opportunity for the Year 10 cohort to spend a weekend on a residential course with practising artists and teachers. This weekend opens the mind to new techniques and shows that anything is possible. Students will come away with a design board and a final piece that can form a part of your coursework.

GCSE English Language has three components, in this case the internal component is made up of two oracy tasks. Students will also sit two external examinations in June at the end of Year 11. These both focus on students' reading and writing skills.

How should students be preparing at home?

By the end of Year 10, students should have extensive knowledge of the novel 'Of Mice and Men'. Ideally, they should have their own copies of this text and be re-reading it at home, making notes in their text in preparation for the assessments. There are also a number of study revision guides that students can purchase online which will aid their learning of the book. They should also be ensuring that any work set on Google Classrooms, whether this is for homework or in cases where they are self-isolating, is completed and completed by the deadlines set by teachers.

In Year 11, students should have access to a wide range of reading material at home in order to develop their reading skills and vocabulary. Spelling and reading homework tasks will be set weekly in order to improve students' spelling, grammar and use of punctuation (spag) which are vitally important in the writing sections of the examinations.

Students at St Joseph's will complete two distinct GCSEs in English: English Literature and English Language. Students will be entered into GCSE Literature this year in Year 10 and they will then complete GCSE English Language in Year 11.

GCSE English Literature has two components this year. The first component is made up of two tasks. Students are currently completing the first of these two tasks which is a task based on the play 'Romeo and Juliet'. Students will start to study for the second task, a poetry comparison, in December. There is also one other component, which is made up of three questions. Two are based on the novel 'Of Mice and Men' by John Steinbeck and the third question is an unseen poetry comparison question.

Examinations

The GCSE in French and German is assessed by a series of exams which take place at the end of Year 11, during the GCSE examination period and are as follows:

Unit 1 - Speaking 25% (60 Marks)

Exam in April or May Year 11 with your teacher, who records the exam, but it is marked by the exam board.

No dictionaries allowed. Foundation tier – 7-9 minutes Higher Tier – 10-12 minutes

Unit 2 - Listening 25% (45 Marks)

Exam in May/June of year 11 Foundation tier = 35 minutes Higher tier= 45 minutes No dictionary allowed.

Unit 3 – Reading 25% (45 Marks)

Exam in May/June of year 11 Foundation tier = 1 hour Higher tier = 1 hour 15 minutes No dictionary allowed.

UNIT 4-WRITING 25% (60 Marks)

Exam in May or June Year 11 Foundation paper = 1 hour 15 minutes Higher paper = 1 hour 30 minutes No dictionary allowed.

About the Subject

Geography is a popular subject at GCSE level which is reflected in the large uptake in the options. Pupils who have opted for this subject will need to be interested in current affairs and have enquiring minds.

KS4 Overview

We started the GCSE in Year 9, where by 2 units were introduced. Pupils will be taught four units in Year 10 and two units in Year 11, with all six have an integral environmental theme.

Year 10

- 1. Core Theme Landscapes & Physical Processes (Field Trip)
- 2. Core Theme Rural-Urban Links (Field Trip)

- Unit 3 NEA [Non-examination assessment] Revision
- 2. Option Tectonics (2nd section)

Assessment

- Pupils are assessed fortnightly by means of mini tests (marked out of 10)
- Pupils are given a written homework once a fortnight which is marked in terms of a raw mark or a GCSE grade.
- ➤ There is an end of unit test, which will include a past GCSE question and other questions testing more specific knowledge.

Terminal Examination and Controlled Assessment

Pupils will sit two papers at the end of Year 11, both lasting 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours each and accounting for 80% of the final mark.

The NEA consists of 3 fieldwork sessions undertaken in the Summer Term of Year 9 and the Autumn Term of Year 11. The write up (2000 words) is completed under direct teacher supervision, in 20 hours during the second half of the Autumn Term in Year 11.

Health and Social Care, and Child Care Iechyd a Gofal Cymdeithasol, a Gofal Plant

About the subject:

Health and Social Care, and Child Care is a vocationally related subject. Pupils develop their knowledge and understanding of Health and Social Care in a vocational context. We have an excellent partnership with a local residential care home. In June 2009 this partnership won an award in the category "Learning about Caring, Caring about Learning" at the Social Care Accolades run by the Care Council for Wales. Health and Social Care is taught in a designated room which is equipped with computers.

KS4 overview:

Health and Social Care, and Child Care consists of coursework (60%) and an external examination (40%). Areas of study include Health, Social Care and Children's Services and Human Growth and Development. Coursework projects are based on an individual known to the pupil. All coursework is produced on computers and started in Year 10 and completed in Year 11. In Year 10, pupils study the unit of work 'Human Growth and Development', with an external examination of 1¼ hours at the end of Year 11.

GCSE

The specification for GCSE ICT is arranged in units:

Unit 1: Understanding ICT

External Assessment: 1½ hours (20%)

This examination paper assesses knowledge and understanding of functional elements of ICT in a home and school context.

Unit 2: Solving problems with ICT

Controlled assessment: 22½ hours (30%)

This controlled assessment requires the pupil to produce a portfolio of work and will test the practical aspects of the functional elements of ICT.

Unit 3: ICT in Organizations

External Assessment: 1½ hours (20%)

This examination paper will assess the 'application' content of ICT in a business and industry context.

Unit 4: Developing Multimedia ICT Solutions

Controlled assessment: 22½ hours (30%)

This controlled assessment gives the pupil the opportunity to develop a piece of work using multimedia software following a task brief issued by WJEC.

This course has been designed to prepare candidates for work in the ICT sector by providing them with an introduction to the skills, knowledge and understanding required in the workplace. Pupils complete units of work enabling them to gain a good basic understanding of ICT on which to build expertise.

Some minor changes have been made recently to the exam content by the WJEC to bring the course more up to date. Pupils have been made aware of these changes.

Mathematics Mathemateg

Introduction

The Maths department occupies 5 rooms each containing a computer linked to a classroom interactive touchscreen. The teaching of maths consists of various strategies to get all pupils engaged. These include the use of small whiteboards, interactive games and a mental and oral starter. Homework is set regularly and most are set via the internet. Homework contains links that involve interactive electronic learning which will assist pupils with the learning of new topics, completing homework and revision.

KS4 overview and course content

Year 10 and 11 pupils study the WJEC examination that consists of a numeracy exam and a maths exam. There are two written papers for each of the exams. There are three tiers of entry, the Higher tier is taken by the top sets and pupils can achieve up-to an A* grade. The intermediate tier that consists of Grades E to B which will be taken by pupils in set 2 and some in set 3. Some pupils may sit the foundation tier.

At present there is no controlled assessment for Mathematics.

Extra Maths Lessons and additional support

The maths department runs a series of workshops and extra lessons to enable pupils to achieve their target grade. Pupils are also given the opportunity to buy a revision guide at a discount price.

Equipment

Your child should come to maths lessons with a pen, pencil, rubber, ruler, protractor and scientific calculator. The preferred model is a Casio. Some lessons will also require pupils to bring a compass but they will be given a lesson notice beforehand.

Homework

Homework is set regularly and most are set via the internet. Most homework will be set via the school's interactive electronic learning environment. Your child can download the homework onto their own computer and print them off. We have also started using the PiXL Maths app that can be downloaded to a phone or iPad.

Assessment

The class teacher will assess pupils on a regular basis and use this information to track pupils' progress. This assessment could be in the form of a short test, or an investigation. There is an exam at the end of Year 10 and a mock exam in December of Year 11. Pupils work is kept in a folder that can be used as a revision resource at the end of the course.

Design and Technology (Product Design) is a course that gives pupils the opportunity to design freely and explore new technologies and their development. Pupils work through a number of practical projects, using a variety of skills and materials to work with.

Throughout the course you will complete 3 design and make projects. The first 2 will focus on developing skills and knowledge and the 3rd will contribute towards you final GCSE Grade. In doing so, the project will involve a folder design task and a working project that will be marked against the GCSE marking scheme externally.

The course is assessed on two areas, the practical and the theory. The practical project is worth 50% of the final marks and is conducted through the 3rd project carried out in school. The theory side is also worth 50% of the final mark and is conducted in a 2 hour exam at the end of the course.

Design and Technology gives you the opportunity to think outside of the box and develop your practical and theory skills in Technology. If you enjoy solving problems and are able to communicate your ideas well in a design area then this may be ideal for you.

About the subject:

WJEC Religious Studies provides opportunities for students to follow a course that is coherent and that balances knowledge of core beliefs, teachings and practices of Catholic Christianity and Judaism, with an understanding of how they can be applied to philosophical and ethical themes.

The course aims to enable students to: develop knowledge and understanding of religious beliefs, teachings, practices and sources of wisdom and authority, through their reading of key scripture passages and other important texts; develop the ability to construct well-argued, well-informed, balanced and structured written arguments, demonstrating their depth and breadth of understanding of the subject; engage with questions of belief, value, meaning, purpose, truth and their influence on human life; reflect on and develop their own values, beliefs and attitudes in the light of what they have learned and contribute to their preparation for adult life in a pluralistic and global community; study Welsh perspectives, enriching students' understanding of the world around them; develop knowledge and understanding of non-religious beliefs, such as atheism and humanism.

Triple Award Science: Pupil will gain 3 GCSE's, Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

Double Award Science: Pupil will in effect gain 2 GCSE's in Science. Double grades will be based on a 15 grade scale, from A*A* to GG.

Controlled Assessment: One practical assessment per GCSE will be set in January of Year 11. These will be done in school but marked externally and are worth 10% of the total mark.

Examinations will be available in the Summer of Year 10 and Summer of Year 11. There are no January examinations or re-sits available.

Triple Award examinations will be 1 hour and 45 minutes in length. Each pupil will sit six examinations, three in Year 10 and three in Year 11, i.e. one each of Biology, Chemistry and Physics in each year.

Double Award examinations will be 1 hour and 15 minutes in length. Each pupil will sit six examinations, three in Year 10 and three in Year 11, i.e. one each of Biology, Chemistry and Physics in each year.

Cymraeg Ail Iaith (Welsh Second Language)

This GCSE specification in Welsh Second Language will enable candidates to:

- Understand and use the language for a variety of purposes and audiences
- Develop language learning skills and strategies in order to enable candidates to communicate and interact confidently and spontaneously in relevant situations and specified context
- Develop language learning skills and strategies to enable candidates to develop their grasp
 Welsh further
- Develop listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in an integrated manner, emphasising listening and speaking skills

This qualification has two external assessment units which are weighted equally and two internal assessment units. The two external assessment units test reading and writing skills while the two internal assessment units test oral and listening skills.

The qualification is made up of four units: Unit 1 and Unit 2 are a non-examination speaking and listening assessment. Unit 3 and Unit 4 are reading and writing examinations. The course is suitable for teaching over two years within 120 guided learning hours.

The context for learning the language is organised under three broad themes: Employment, Wales and the World and Youth.

Candidates will be required to demonstrate their ability to:

Speak (30%) – communicate and interact effectively in different situations and contexts
Listen (20%) – understand and respond to different types of spoken language in a variety of contexts
Read (25%) – understand and respond to a variety of written language in a range of contexts
Write (25%) – communicate effectively for different purposes and for different audiences
This specification builds on subject content which is typically taught as a second language at Key Stage
3 and provides a suitable foundation for the study of Welsh second language at either AS or A level.

GCSE Skills TGAU Sgiliau



Pupils will have approximately 2 hours of English, 2 hours of Maths and 1 hour of SCC. Homework is kept to a minimum. The sessions give pupils the opportunity to reinforce their learning and relieve individual feedback from specialist English/Maths teachers.

1. English/Literacy

In their Skills Literacy lessons, students will have the opportunity to improve and further develop their English skills. In Year 10, students in English will be completing their GCSE English Literature and the work completed in Skills lessons will complement this work:

Winter term

Students will complete a range of Shakespeare and Poetry tasks which will support their learning of these topics when they sit the internal examinations before Christmas.

Spring term

Students will study the set text 'Of Mice and Men' by John Steinbeck in more depth, with a focus on the context of the novel.

Summer term

Students will practise their Poetry Comparison skills through completing a range of questions, in preparation for the question on the external examination.

In Year 11, lessons will focus on writing accurately with a particular focus on spelling, punctuation and grammar.

2. Mathematics/Numeracy

This course is based on supporting pupils with mathematical skills in real life situations and help pupils to become numerically independent adults in the future.

The priority is to put maths real life situation learning skills that will be valuable to students when leaving school and having to solve real life numerical problems. The course is closely linked to numeracy GCSE with an emphasis on understanding finance. Examples of topics are best buys, mortgages, interest rates, salary contracts and bills.

Students will build on previous knowledge and develop confidence. They will use everyday maths skills to solve problems including long multiplication, percentages, measuring and manipulating data.

What is the Skills Challenge Certificate (SCC)?

The Welsh Baccalaureate is based upon a **Skills Challenge Certificate GCSE** alongside **Supporting Qualifications**. The requirements of the Skills Challenge Certificate and the Supporting Qualifications must be met in order to achieve the overarching Welsh Baccalaureate.

General Overview of the Skills Challenge Certificate

The Skills Challenge Certificate has been designed to consolidate and develop **essential** and **employability skills**. They are:

- 1. Literacy
- 2. Numeracy
- 3. Digital Literacy
- 4. Critical Thinking and Problem Solving
- 5. Planning and Organisation
- 6. Creativity and Innovation
- 7. Personal Effectiveness

The emphasis of the Skills Challenge Certificate is on applied learning so that learners are equipped with transferable skills allowing them to progress with confidence when in the world of work. The challenges [see below] allow learners to develop their knowledge and understanding of society, their community and an awareness of global issues and perspectives.

How it is assessed

The **Skills Challenge Certificate** consists of four components which will be followed by all of our learners:

- 1. Enterprise and Employability Challenge Year 10 (Autumn / Spring Term)
- 2. Global Citizenship Challenge Year 9 (Summer Term) and Year 10 (Autumn Term)
- 3. Community Challenge Year 10 (Spring / Summer Term)
- 4. An Individual Project Year 11 (Autumn / Spring Term)

How it is delivered

The teaching and learning aspects of the 3 challenges and the Controlled Assessment will be completed in Humanities lessons in Year 9 and in collapsed timetable days and timetabled PSE lessons during Year 10. All of these dates can be found in the Parent/Pupil calendar.

The project will be started at the end of Year 10 and will be delivered in Year 11 timetabled PSE and Welsh Baccalaureate lessons and, to a lesser extent, some collapsed timetable days.
