Year 9 Talacre

Since September, Year 9 have investigating different been marine environments. From our local sand dunes to far off coral reefs, pupils have been considering different the characteristics of these environments whilst learning a little about the creatures who inhabit them. Pupils completed transect surveys across the sand dunes, found out a little about the salt marshes, undertook strandline survey, litter picked and joined the land owner conservation officer to hear about the management of the sand dunes. On Friday the 20th October, 29 Year 11 pupils headed out to the Nant BH outdoor centre for a GCSE maths revision trip. The trip

started with a night walk activity consisting of following map bearings around a path near to a lake and then back to the centre.

The next day we were off to the nearby lake where we had a session on Canadian Canoes. The course we went on was pre planned and followed a right angled triangle.



There was a short break on the opposite side, where pupils learnt how to light a fire with a flint and toasted marshmallows. When we got back to the centre, we could work out the angles that we turned through on the and the distances course travelled using Pythagoras and Trigonometry.



The other activities were high ropes, orienteering and to conclude the weekend a gorge walk. Each activity had a maths problem to solve back at the classroom and there were many more topics studied throughout the weekend.





Excellent progress was made, with Maths topics covered at every opportunity including a special drop in Algebra session during some of the activities.

The group had a fantastic time and learnt many skills in both Maths and Outdoor Pursuits and was a fantastic way of revising Maths for their GCSE exam starting on Monday 13th November with Unit 1 and Wednesday 15th November is Unit 2.



You can support your child by encouraging them to revise using MathsWatch, Corbett cards, past papers and MathsDiy. Please make sure your child has the correct equipment including a scientific calculator, pens, pencils, protractor, compass, ruler and rubber.

There is a weekly year 11 podcast that is available every Tuesday via google classrooms (2b6gqme) which also contains strategies for solving maths questions and parent information. Miss Jobson also has youtube channel with excellent maths videos to assist with understanding of key topics.

Match Report

Bus Passes

As of Monday 6th November, all pupils traveling to school via school transport will be required to show the driver their valid bus pass. Failure to do so will result in refusal to travel. If your child has misplaced their bus pass, please contact the School Transport Department within WCBC to arrange for a replacement.

Mobile Phones

Mobile phones and electronic devices such as iPods, iPads and cameras are not allowed in school.

In exceptional circumstances, if pupils need to bring a mobile phone into school then parents/carers must write to me asking permission beforehand and stating the reason for the request.

If the request is granted, a contract will be signed to ensure that strict guidelines are adhered to e.g. the mobile phone must be kept in a transparent pencil case with the pupil's name clearly marked on it and the phone must handed reception to immediately upon arrival and collected at the end of the day.

For those pupils with agreements in place, there are an increasing number of phones that are brought for safe-keeping unsuitable cases and inadequately labelled. Therefore if phones are not presented in a transparent

pencil case, clearly marked with pupil's details, the agreement will be withdrawn.
